How Big is the Problem?

Retail theft and Organized Retail Crime Long-term problems with explosive growth

- 54% of small businesses experienced an increase in theft
- \$112 billion lost nationally
- Almost \$3 billion in Washington State over \$300 million in lost state and local taxes

Working Together to Address the Issues




- 1. Telling the story educating the public and elected officials
- 2. Making it harder to sell stolen goods National *Integrity, Notification, and Fairness in Online Retail Marketplaces for Consumers Act* (INFORM) – effective 6/27/23
- 3. National pilot "Vibrant Communities" initiative Seattle/King County – Retail Industry Leaders Association
- 4. Passing legislation and funding to support law enforcement, prosecutors, diversion and treatment programs, and ORC Statewide taskforce



Working together to address the issues

A Multi-Pronged Approach (cont.)

- 5. Coordination with State ORC Task Force and the Washington State Organized Retail Crime Association (WAORCA)
- 6. Supporting national legislation the Combatting Organized Retail Crime Act – CORCA – S. 140 HR 895
- 7. Providing resources for small and midsized retailers and municipalities – Guide for Public Safety

Specific efforts at the local and state level:

Initiative – 2113 – Passed!

 Restores safe, trained, and approved vehicle pursuits by law enforcement for property crimes – became effective June 6.



Specific efforts continued:

State Operating Budget \$1,000,000

 Combatting organized retail crime – 3 pilot programs – 2 on westside and 1 east of the cascades. Focus on reporting, diversion efforts, coordination between agencies.



Specific efforts continued:

Grants for small business Theft prevention efforts

 Small business (50 or fewer employees) could receive grants for bollards, barriers, cameras, fencing, and other theft prevention efforts.







Strategies to protect employees and stores

- Artificial intelligence to help catch the criminals
- Product behind counters and locking product display cases
- Automatic License Plate Recognition - FLOCK
- Locking shopping cartwheels
- Hiring off duty police and security
