The list is updated weekly, and bills may be removed, added, or moved within categories at any time.

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Other – Monitoring or requesting amendments

<u>HB 1096</u>	Lot splitting bill requires cities to set up an administrative process to approve a parcel split without a public hearing when certain conditions are met. With agreed upon amendments, AWC will be neutral.	Needs floor action
<u>HB 1183</u>	Omnibus development regulation bill adds six new sections to the GMA, requires all cities and towns to comply with two of them, and amends an existing chapter of GMA.	Needs floor action
<u>HB 1213</u>	Expands the Paid Family Medical Leave program by lowering the eligibility requirements and increasing job protection elements creating more administrative burden and costs. Does allow concurrent counting of PFML and FMLA leave. Some helpful amendments have been adopted. AWC continues to oppose the expansion to all small employers, but is working with stakeholders to amend the bill to mitigate impacts on employers.	Needs floor action
<u>HB 1399</u>	Updates statutes to create consistency for police chief certification requirements. Limits police volunteer activities. AWC requesting the section on volunteers be removed or modified.	Needs floor action
<u>HB 1491</u>	Transit Oriented Development (TOD) proposal seeks to increase density and reduce regulations in areas around rail and bus rapid transit. The bill does contain a proposed grant program to support infrastructure. Impacted cities continue to provide technical feedback.	Needs floor action
<u>HB 1549</u>	Adds criteria for "responsible bidders": must have completed at least one PW project in the last three years, must not have received a citation under responsible bidder or prevailing wage RCWs OR have designated person that has received RB and PW training within the previous three years. Removes exemption for those who have completed three or more projects and maintained WA license for three years.	Needs floor action
<u>HB 1633</u>	Within one hour of bid submittal time, prime contractor must submit list of licensed HVAC, plumbing, and electrical subcontractors or to name itself, if licensed to perform the work.	Needs floor action
<u>SB 5061</u>	Requires wages for public works projects to be paid at the prevailing wage in effect when work is performed. AWC working with stakeholders on revisions including exempting small projects and other technical adjustments.	Needs floor action
<u>SB 5148</u>	Housing Accountability Act. The bill encourages cities to go through a voluntary approval process, which would delay adoption of a cities' new, updated housing GMA elements and development regulations until they are approved by the state—including those updates the state directed cities to make. Ways & Means amendment improves the bill slightly.	Needs floor action; Seeking updated feedback
