It is not intended to be a comprehensive list of the bills that AWC is <u>tracking</u> or taking a position on. The list is updated weekly, and bills may be removed, added, or moved within categories at any time.

Opposed

Extends interest arbitration for collective bargaining for law enforcement officers to cities and towns under 2,500 in population creating new and administrative requirements and increases costs. SB 5041 Allows striking workers to collect unemployment insurance. Requires a final judgment declaring a strike illegal before declining or requiring repayment of benefits paid to striking employees. Public employees are statutorily prohibited from striking so the bill has the potential to leave taxpayers funding benefits paid during an illegal strike without taking costly legal action. SB 5184 Significantly reduces local authority to set on-site parking requirements for cities over 30,000 in population, down to no parking requirements at all for several uses. SR 6503 Revises PERC procedures. AWC opposes the provision in Section 4 that would make it impossible to enter into agreements to settle grievance cases. An amendment to address the most significant concerns was rejected. SR 5804 Effectively diverts the funding from the Public Works Assistance Account out of the program and uses it instead to pay for bonds to fulfill the state's obligation to address state-owned fish blocking culverts.
