Notes:

- Upcoming deadline: Sine Die (adjournment) April 27
- *Indicates a bill believed to be Necessary to Implement the Budget (NTIB) and exempt from previous deadlines
- Floor action indicates the bill needs to move to the floor to be voted on by the full House or Senate
- Concurrence is required when the opposite house passes an amended version of the bill and the house of origin needs to approve the amendment version. If they do not concur a bill can die from lack of concurrence or the bodies can send the bill to conference committee to work out a compromise.
